IMMEDIATE STEPS AFTER A LINE-OF-DUTY DEATH

The death of a law enforcement officer in the line of duty is a moment of profound loss. In its aftermath, agencies and families are often faced with a series of decisions and responsibilities that must be addressed immediately. This section provides a structured, practical overview of the most critical early steps.

ODMP exists to ensure every fallen officer is recognized, remembered, and honored with dignity. We are often the first point of contact after a loss, and our memorialization efforts, notification systems, and long-term support play an essential role in guiding agencies and families through the days that follow.

REPORT A FALLEN OFFICER TO ODMP

One of the first steps an agency can take is to formally notify *ODMP* of a line-of-duty death. *ODMP* maintains the most comprehensive memorial database of fallen officers in the United States. When a report is submitted, we verify the information and publish an official memorial page to honor the officer's service and sacrifice. This page becomes a permanent record—viewed and shared by law enforcement, families, and supporters across the country.

In addition to the memorial, *ODMP* activates its Line of Duty Death (LODD) Notification system. These alerts are distributed nationally, helping ensure the officer's name and story are acknowledged across the law enforcement community.

To report a death:

- Visit ODMP.org and select "Report a Line-of-Duty Death"
- · Provide the officer and agency information
- Submissions are reviewed and published promptly, often within hours

To receive notifications:

- Sign up at ODMP.org/register
- · Agencies may also request department-specific alerts

IMMEDIATE STEPS FOR AGENCIES AND FAMILIES

After notifying ODMP, a series of actions must be taken. Some can be addressed quickly, while others unfold over the coming days. Agencies and families may find it helpful to designate a point of contact—someone who can manage communications, interface with support organizations, and provide consistent updates.

Agencies should:

- · Identify a department liaison to assist the family
- Notify organizations that provide immediate and ongoing survivor support (including C.O.P.S.)
- Coordinate funeral and memorial planning, including interagency involvement and ceremonial protocol
- Begin collecting documentation related to benefits, insurance, and employment

Families should:

- · Identify an agency contact to assist with logistics
- Begin gathering essential paperwork (e.g., ID cards, insurance policies, pension details)
- Review available survivor benefit resources and determine next steps
- Consider assigning a trusted advocate to help manage information, decisions, and communication

For help managing financial accounts, legal paperwork, and other personal matters, additional resources are listed in the Survivor Benefits & Mental Health Support section of this guide.

MANAGING PERSONAL AFFAIRS AFTER A LOSS

In the days and weeks following a line-of-duty death, families are often faced with a long list of personal, financial, and legal matters to resolve—each of which can feel overwhelming during a time of grief. This includes everything from closing accounts to managing estate issues and navigating paperwork tied to benefits and pensions.

To support families through these challenges, *ODMP* recommends working with trusted professionals who specialize in guiding survivors through these next steps.

STEPS AFTER LIFE

Steps After Life is a specialized service designed to assist surviving families with the logistics of managing a loved one's affairs after death. The organization provides personalized checklists, one-on-one guidance, and support in addressing a wide range of practical tasks.

What They Do: Steps After Life helps families manage post-loss responsibilities, including financial accounts, real estate, and subscription closures. ODMP shares this resource with families seeking compassionate, professional help navigating these often overlooked but essential tasks.

SURVIVOR BENEFITS & MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORT

In the aftermath of a line-of-duty death, survivors often find themselves navigating unfamiliar systems while coping with overwhelming grief. This section provides direct access to organizations offering financial assistance, counseling, peer support, and mental health services—resources that are essential in the days, weeks, and years that follow a loss. These programs represent some of the most trusted and accessible forms of support available to law enforcement families. Each has been selected based on frequent referrals made by ODMP through its survivor outreach and resource efforts.

FINANCIAL & SURVIVOR BENEFITS

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE - PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICERS' BENEFITS (PSOB) PROGRAM

The Public Safety Officers' Benefits (PSOB) Program, administered by the U.S. Department of Justice, was established to provide financial support to families of public safety officers who are killed or catastrophically injured in the line of duty. The program delivers a one-time death benefit to eligible survivors, education assistance to spouses and children, and disability benefits for officers who suffer permanent, service-related injuries.

What They Do: *PSOB* provides federally administered financial benefits that often serve as a critical first step for families rebuilding their lives after a loss. *ODMP* frequently refers families to *PSOB* early in the support process as a foundational federal benefit.

CONCERNS OF POLICE SURVIVORS (C.O.P.S.)

Concerns of Police Survivors (C.O.P.S.) has supported families of fallen law enforcement officers since 1984. With chapters in every U.S. state, C.O.P.S. offers a broad range of services—including grief counseling, peer support, survivor retreats, and scholarships. These programs are tailored to spouses, children, parents, siblings, and coworkers, recognizing the wide scope of those affected by a line-of-duty death. Survivor-led and deeply embedded in the law enforcement community, C.O.P.S. provides a stable and trusted network for those navigating the months and years after a loss.

What They Do: C.O.P.S. delivers structured, ongoing peer and counseling support, rooted in shared experience. ODMP consistently highlights C.O.P.S. as one of the most trusted and widely used support systems among law enforcement families.

MENTAL HEALTH & COUNSELING SERVICES

WARRIOR'S REST FOUNDATION

Warrior's Rest Foundation provides trauma-informed peer support and emotional wellness services to first responders and their families. Founded by law enforcement professionals, the organization offers specialized training for peer support teams, facilitates Post-Critical Incident Seminars (PCIS), and provides ongoing education on resilience, stress recovery, and mental health leadership. Programs are grounded in first-hand experience and delivered by a team of current and retired public safety professionals.

What They Do: Warrior's Rest Foundation supports both agencies and individuals in building trauma-informed mental wellness programs. ODMP shares this resource with departments and families looking for evidence-based approaches to long-term recovery.

FIRST RESPONDERS CHILDREN'S FOUNDATION – RESILIENCY PROGRAM

First Responders Children's Foundation has served the families of public safety personnel for over two decades. Its Resiliency Program offers access to licensed, trauma-informed therapists who work with children and families affected by the unique stresses and grief associated with public safety work. The program provides confidential, no-cost therapy and emotional support to help families manage anxiety, PTSD, depression, and loss. Sessions are available virtually or in person where possible, allowing families across the country to connect with the care they need.

What They Do: This program ensures access to licensed mental health professionals with experience in trauma and child psychology. *ODMP* often recommends the Resiliency Program as a direct response to families seeking child- and family-focused support.

AXON AID WELLNESS

Axon Aid, the philanthropic arm of Axon, developed its Wellness initiative to provide mental health resources to law enforcement officers and their families. Recognizing the cumulative stress and trauma officers often experience, Axon Aid Wellness offers confidential, culturally competent tools designed specifically for public safety professionals. Their video library includes scenario-based guidance, trauma science education, and peer support techniques—all built to strengthen mental resilience and support agency wellness efforts. The program is accessible at no cost and is available to both individuals and departments.

What They Do: Axon Aid Wellness provides accessible, no-cost digital tools for building emotional resilience in law enforcement.

FIRST RESPONDER THERAPY DOGS

First Responder Therapy Dogs is a national nonprofit organization that provides certified therapy dog visits to public safety agencies. Their mission is to support the emotional wellbeing of first responders by offering a calming, non-clinical presence during and after traumatic events. Available in most states, their volunteer teams respond to critical incidents and provide on-site support for law enforcement, fire, EMS, and dispatch personnel. These visits help reduce stress, improve emotional regulation, and offer immediate comfort in high-pressure environments.

What They Do: Therapy dog teams deliver emotional comfort following incidents that impact first responders. ODMP features this unique resource as a helpful option for agencies managing stress within their ranks.

CHARITY & FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR FAMILIES

AXON AID - FALLEN OFFICER FUND

The Fallen Officer Fund is part of Axon Aid's broader support initiative for the law enforcement community. The fund provides direct financial assistance to families of officers killed in the line of duty, helping with funeral costs, emergency expenses, and other immediate needs. Support is delivered quickly, and in some cases, Axon employees contribute through internal fundraising efforts. The program is designed to ensure families receive timely help without unnecessary barriers during one of the most difficult periods of their lives.

What They Do: The Fallen Officer Fund offers fast-response financial relief to newly bereaved law enforcement families. ODMP recommends this fund as part of its initial set of support options following notification of a line-of-duty death.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Following a line-of-duty death, many families face the added burden of planning for educational futures under unexpected financial stress. Scholarships offered specifically for surviving children and spouses can ease this pressure and open doors to new opportunities. The following programs are well-established, trusted resources that ODMP frequently includes in its outreach to families. Each organization offers unique support, eligibility guidance, and dedicated assistance in navigating the application process.

CONCERNS OF POLICE SURVIVORS (C.O.P.S.) – SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Concerns of Police Survivors (C.O.P.S.) provides ongoing support to the families of fallen officers, including access to post-secondary educational assistance. The organization has awarded scholarships for decades and offers a structured, survivor-led review process that ensures families receive fair and thoughtful consideration. Scholarships are available to surviving spouses and children, and may be renewed for multiple years of study at accredited institutions.

What They Do: The C.O.P.S. Scholarship Program funds undergraduate, graduate, and vocational education for survivors, covering tuition, books, and related expenses. ODMP regularly shares this scholarship opportunity as part of its follow-up support, especially for families with college-bound children or spouses pursuing retraining.

FIRST RESPONDERS CHILDREN'S FOUNDATION – GENERAL SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

First Responders Children's Foundation has served the families of first responders for more than twenty years, offering long-term educational and emotional support. Its flagship

scholarship program is open to children of first responders who have died or become permanently disabled in the line of duty. In addition to financial assistance, the foundation offers leadership programming and career readiness support to help scholars thrive.

What They Do: The General Scholarship Program provides renewable funding for college students based on academic performance, leadership, and financial need. *ODMP* includes this program in its survivor outreach and recommends it as part of a well-rounded set of scholarship options.

GRATITUDE INITIATIVE – COLLEGE SUCCESS ACADEMY

Gratitude Initiative is a national nonprofit dedicated to helping the children of military and law enforcement personnel succeed in college and beyond. Its College Success Academy provides long-term, personalized support through each stage of the academic journey—from high school course planning to college applications and career readiness. The program is delivered virtually and includes expert-led guidance for students and their families.

ADVOCACY & LEGAL SUPPORT

Following a line-of-duty death, families often face difficult legal, political, or bureaucratic challenges. These may include navigating parole hearings, securing long-term housing stability, or accessing survivor programs funded through public or charitable efforts. The organizations below provide direct advocacy, legal assistance, and nationwide awareness campaigns to support law enforcement families and honor the memory of the fallen. ODMP connects families and departments with these efforts to ensure their voices are heard and their rights protected.

ODMP - NO PAROLE FOR COP KILLERS

As part of its public advocacy work, *ODMP* leads the national *No Parole for Cop Killers* campaign, which empowers survivors and supporters to speak out against the early release of individuals convicted of murdering law enforcement officers. The campaign maintains a growing registry of parole cases and mobilizes the law enforcement community to submit letters and statements in opposition.

What They Do: *ODMP* provides pre-written parole protest letters, email alerts, and public-facing tools that allow citizens to take action. The campaign ensures survivors are notified of upcoming hearings and helps amplify their voices during the parole process.

LAW ENFORCEMENT UNITED (LEU)

Law Enforcement United (LEU) is a volunteer-run nonprofit organization comprised of law enforcement officers, survivors, and supporters who raise awareness and funding

for line-of-duty death causes. Each year, *LEU* organizes memorial rides and events that honor fallen officers and directly support programs benefiting surviving families.

What They Do: LEU hosts multi-day memorial rides such as the Road to Hope, raising funds for organizations like C.O.P.S. and expanding public awareness about the impact of officer loss. ODMP recognizes LEU as a major grassroots force in the survivor support community and encourages participation from riders and donors alike.

TUNNELS TO TOWERS – FALLEN FIRST RESPONDER HOME PROGRAM

The Tunnels to Towers Foundation honors the sacrifice of first responders and military service members by supporting the families they leave behind. Through its Fallen First Responder Home Program, the foundation pays off mortgages for surviving families of officers killed in the line of duty, with a particular focus on those with young children or 9/11-related health conditions.

What They Do: Tunnels to Towers removes the financial burden of housing by providing mortgage-free homes to eligible survivors. ODMP includes this program as a resource for families in need of immediate, life-stabilizing support after the death of an officer.

OFFICER SAFETY & TRAINING

ODMP honors fallen officers by working to prevent future line-ofduty deaths. The organizations listed below focus on increasing officer safety and wellness through training, resources, and access to critical equipment. BELOW 100

Founded in 2010 by a group of veteran law enforcement professionals, *Below 100* is a national initiative committed to changing the culture of officer safety. The name reflects a bold and measurable goal: reduce annual line-of-duty deaths in the United States to fewer than 100. Through engaging, real-world training and department-level policy change, Below 100 equips agencies to make intentional, safety-first decisions at every level of service. Its approach is grounded in humility, accountability, and tactical realism.

What They Do: Below 100 delivers in-person and online training modules focused on tactical decision-making, situational awareness, and risk avoidance. ODMP recommends this program as a trusted and proactive resource for agencies seeking to prevent avoidable tragedies.

INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF CHIEFS OF POLICE (IACP) – OFFICER SAFETY & WELLNESS RESOURCES

Vest for Life is an outreach project of the St. Michael's Shield Foundation, created to help officers across the United States obtain the life-saving body armor they need. The organization collects used, serviceable ballistic vests from departments and individual donors, then distributes them to officers whose agencies cannot afford to issue adequate protective gear. Their mission is simple but vital: ensure that no officer goes without a vest.

BRADY'S K9 FUND

Founded by 8-year-old Brady Snakovsky in 2018, *Brady's K9 Fund* began as a one-boy mission to provide protective gear for police dogs and has since grown into a national nonprofit supporting K9 units across the country. Recognizing that police dogs face the same dangers as their handlers, Brady's organization provides custom ballistic vests to ensure their safety during critical operations. The fund is sustained through community support and partnerships with law enforcement agencies nationwide.

What They Do: Brady's K9 Fund donates ballistic vests to active-duty police dogs, providing critical protection in highrisk scenarios. ODMP proudly includes this resource in its outreach to K9 handlers and departments seeking to enhance officer safety across their units.
